PURPOSE OF GRANT

The current landlord EPCOR stands in support of this construction effort to provide a safe, effective, efficient facility for Veterans Service Officers personnel to use as their base of operations.

Target Population

San Tan Valley is an unincorporated community located in Arizona. With a 2023 population of 105,465, it is the 11th largest city in Arizona and the 327th largest city in the United States. San Tan Valley is currently growing at a rate of 1.79% annually and its population has increased by 5.58% since the most recent census, which recorded a population of 99,894 in 2020. Spanning over 37 miles, San Tan Valley has a population density of 2,876 people per square mile.

Within the San Tan Valley area which has approximately 6,553 Veterans living in the area. The Florence area has approximately 2,418 Veterans. Coolidge area has approximately 1,147 and Queen Creek has 3,101. These figures are based on the 2020 US Census.

Project Goals

Veteran Service Officers (VSOs) are trained professionals who work on behalf of veterans to help them access the benefits and services they have earned through their military service. These benefits may include disability compensation, education and training, healthcare, and more.

VSOs are employed by various organizations, including federal, state, and local governments, as well as nonprofit organizations such as veterans service organizations (VSOs). They are trained to provide guidance and support to veterans and their families, helping them to navigate the often complex and confusing process of applying for and receiving benefits.

Goals and Objectives

There are two major goals for the Veterans Service Officers (VSO) Project and specific objectives within each of the goals.

Goal #1 - Stand Alone Structure

Objective #1.1 - To provide a safe area to assist veterans with their Veterans Affairs (VA) claims.

Objective #1.2 - Through a comprehensive approach of outreach, events, and programs, we're promoting long-term wellness and sustainable growth.

Objective #1.3 – Provide assistance to anyone connected to service members and veterans, including immediate and extended family members.

Objective # 1.4- Offer free of charge to anyone seeking assistance with any VA claims process.

Goal #2 - Provides Veteran Service Officers (VSOs) who can assist Veterans with accessing VA benefits and services. VSOs are trained professionals who can help Veterans understand their eligibility for VA benefits and assist with the application process.

Objective #2.1 If a Veteran is unable to visit a VA facility in person due to the long distance, there are several options for accessing VSO assistance:

Objective #2.2 Online Assistance: Many VSOs provide online assistance to Veterans. This can include assistance with filling out VA forms, answering questions about benefits, and helping with appeals.

Objective #2.3 Telephone Assistance: VSOs may also provide telephone assistance to Veterans who are unable to visit a VA facility in person. This can include answering questions, providing information about benefits, and assisting with the application process.

Objective #2.3 Local Resources: Veterans may also be able to access VSO assistance through local resources, such as Veterans Service Organizations (VSOs) or county Veteran service offices. These local resources may have trained VSOs who can provide assistance in person or through other means.




