24 Of the \$25,329,700 appropriated to the GIITEM line item, \$13,275,800
25 shall be used for one hundred department of public safety GIITEM
26 personnel. The additional staff shall include at least fifty sworn
27 department of public safety positions to be used for immigration
28 enforcement and border security and fifty department of public safety
29 positions to assist GIITEM in various efforts, including:

- 30 1. Strictly enforcing all federal laws relating to illegal aliens
31 and arresting illegal aliens.

1 2. Responding to or assisting any county sheriff or attorney in
2 investigating complaints of employment of illegal aliens.

3 3. Enforcing Arizona's law known as the Legal Arizona Workers Act,
4 strictly enforcing Arizona's SB 1070, Arizona's "Support Our Law
5 Enforcement and Safe Neighborhoods Act" and investigating crimes of
6 identity theft in the context of hiring illegal aliens and the unlawful
7 entry into this country.

8 4. Taking strict enforcement action.

9 Any change in the GIITEM mission or allocation of monies shall be
10 approved by the joint legislative budget committee. The department shall
11 submit an expenditure plan to the joint legislative budget committee for
12 review before expending any monies not identified in the department's
13 previous expenditure plans.

14 Of the \$25,329,700 appropriated to the GIITEM line item, only
15 \$1,403,400 is deposited in the GIITEM fund established by section 41-1724,
16 Arizona Revised Statutes, and is appropriated for the purposes of that
17 section. The \$1,403,400 is exempt from the provisions of section 35-190,
18 Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations. This
19 state recognizes that states have inherent authority to arrest a person for
20 any immigration violation.

21 Any monies remaining in the department of public safety joint account
22 on June 30, 2024 revert to the funds from which they were appropriated.
23 The reverted monies shall be returned in direct proportion to the amounts
24 appropriated.

25 On or before September 1, 2023, the department of public safety shall
26 submit an expenditure plan for the local border support line item to the
27 joint legislative budget committee and the governor's office of strategic
28 planning and budgeting.

29 The \$12,232,900 appropriated for the local border support line item
30 shall be used to fund local law enforcement officer positions for border
31 drug interdiction to deter and apprehend any individuals who are charged
32 with drug trafficking, human smuggling, illegal immigration and other

1 border-related crimes. The monies shall also be used for grants to cities,
2 towns and counties for costs associated with prosecuting and detaining
3 individuals who are charged with drug trafficking, human smuggling, illegal
4 immigration and other border-related crimes. The department may fund all
5 capital-related equipment.

6 Until all of the monies in the civil air patrol infrastructure line
7 item have been distributed, on or before December 1 of each year, the
8 department of public safety shall submit a report to the joint legislative
9 budget committee on the monies distributed from the civil air patrol
10 infrastructure line item and the intended purposes of the distributions.

11 Of the amount appropriated for the department of public safety
12 onetime vehicle replacement line item in fiscal year 2022-2023 pursuant to
13 Laws 2022, chapter 313, section 77, \$11,709,300 from the state general fund
14 is exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes,
15 relating to the lapsing of appropriations, until June 30, 2025 for the
16 purpose of vehicle replacement.

17 Of the amount appropriated for the onetime vehicle replacement line
18 item, \$11,709,300 are exempt from the provisions of section 35-190, Arizona
19 Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of appropriations, until June 30,
20 2025.

21 Of the amount appropriated in the real-time crime centers line item,
22 \$2,600,000 shall be distributed to the city of Peoria and \$1,500,000 to the
23 city of Tucson to operate real-time crime centers that:

24 1. Use technology to effectively and safely provide assistance to
25 law enforcement agencies and fire departments and districts.

26 2. Integrate crime investigation technology to provide real-time
27 information to responding law enforcement agencies and fire departments and
28 districts.

29 3. Are available for use by law enforcement agencies and fire
30 departments and districts that are located in any city, town or county in
31 the region.

1 Of the amount appropriated in the total appropriation for the
2 department of public safety, \$187,051,200 is designated for personal
3 services and \$76,864,000 is designated for employee-related expenditures.
4 The department shall submit an expenditure plan to the joint legislative
5 budget committee for review before spending these monies for other than
6 personal services or employee-related expenditures.

7 Of the amount appropriated in the fentanyl prosecution, diversion and
8 testing fund deposit line item, up to \$50,000 and 0.5 FTE positions may be
9 used for costs associated with administering the fentanyl prosecution,
10 diversion and testing fund.

11 Of the amount appropriated in the operating lump sum, \$798,600 is for
12 a onetime increase from the state general fund in fiscal year 2023-2024 for
13 onetime operating expenses. The \$798,600 is exempt from the provisions of
14 section 35-190, Arizona Revised Statutes, relating to lapsing of
15 appropriations.

16 ~~Of the amount appropriated in the law enforcement retention~~
17 ~~initiatives line item, \$1,000,000 shall be used to acquire coaching~~
18 ~~resources with a special emphasis on improved retention and development of~~

22 (f) Be accessible on a wide variety of common law enforcement agency
23 devices such as desktops, laptops, in-car computers and mobile devices.

24 (g) Have a demonstrated track record of meeting or exceeding similar
25 mission needs and the ability to reach full operational capability within
26 ninety days of initiation.

27 (h) Allow for integration with existing law enforcement agency
28 identify and access management solutions, such as single-sign-on and
29 multi-factor authentication.

30 (i) Be hosted in a secure, criminal justice information services
31 compliant cloud environment that can scale to accommodate the increasing
32 volume and velocity of Arizona law enforcement data needs.

1 (j) Meet or exceed all federal bureau of investigation criminal
2 justice information services security standards.

3 (k) Provide granular audit logging for all user interactions with
4 data.

5 (l) Provide a fully open, interoperable architecture and business
6 terms that ensure that Arizona law enforcement agencies retain full and
7 total rights to agency data at all times.
