1. Briefly describe your organization's history, mission and goals.

IBBB was granted 501c3 status on 4/20/2020. Since that time, our 15 volunteers have fostered nearly 800 kittens. We alter them, chip them and guarantee they have shots and are in good health before arranging adoptions. We are the ONLY neo-natal kitten nursery in Pinal County, giving these tiniest felines a chance to thrive. We also host low cost spay/neuter clinics for our low-income residents in Pinal County. Our clinics also provide residents with low-cost TNR (Trap, Neuter,Return) to reduce feral cat population.

No government agency can staff to care for these infants. We work closely with Pinal County Animal Care and Control, City or Casa Grande and City of Eloy Animal Care and Control and Valley Humane Society. Their dedicated staff members often call on us to pull newborns from their shelters. We have never said no.

3. Describe the proposed project, objectives, and your plan to implement.

This grant would allow us to extend our reach and care for more kittens. We have the capacity right now to care for about 200 kittens annually. In 2024, nearly 300 passed through our doors.

4. Describe how the proposed project satisfies one or more of the priority funding areas identified by the Gila River Indian Community. We host several spay/neuter clinics each year and staff them with our volunteers. Our goal is to provide low-cost alterations to the low-income residents of Pinal County. Currently, a spay surgery at a veterinary hospital costs between \$300 and \$400. When a family is struggling to pay the rent, this is an unrealistic demand. Our providers, AsaVet Charities and Dr. Trina Neufeld's MASH mobile hospital, charge about \$100 per animal. We charge our residents about \$60, making up the rest of the cost with grants, adoption fees and donations. Our clinics are exclusively for cats owned by low-income families and for TNR cats. By hosting these clinics, we hope to help reduce the numbers of feral cats in Pinal County and help families keep their pets.

6. Identify the needs/problems to be addressed, the target population and number of people to be served by the project.

We are addressing a two-pronged problem. First, low-income families cannot afford to alter their animals. Some people allow their pets to roam, giving the pets ample opportunity to reproduce. Between 40 and 60 animals can be altered at each clinic. This helps to reduce the unwanted kitten population. We also educate owners to the dangers of allowing a pet to roam. Second, there is a growing problem of colony cats living in and around our towns. Providing education, traps and clinics also helps reduce the size of these colonies. Statistics show that if 40% of a colony is altered, the size of the group will remain stable.

 This is a continuing program. We have never received funding from GRIC.

Our timeline is flexible. We usually schedule our large clinics in the cooler months. Our volunteers and the mobile clinic staff members are outdoors a lot during these events.

October to April is safer for them, the clients and the animals. In addition, we attend mobile clinics in Maricopa to accommodate as many more clients as we can.

9. Identify other organizations, partners or funders participating in the project and their roles.

We contact PCACC, City of Casa Grande Animal Care and Control and the Valley Humane Society to take custody of the animals for which they are unable to care. Both PCACC and City of Casa Grande have provided locations for our clinics in the past. In addition, Cowboy Church in Casa Grande and Central Lutheran in Arizona City have and continue to welcome our clinics at their sites. We have received grants from the Bonnie Kay Foundation to fund veterinary care for our kittens. We have also received grants from Steven's Haven to help pay for clinics in the past.

10. Would you be able to implement the proposed plan if your organization received partial funding for this project?

We are dedicated to this project. The main limitation is funding. Should we receive partial funding, we will be limited in the number of clinics we can host. That said, we are grateful for any assistance we receive.

11. Describe your plan for project financial sustainability beyond the grant period. If this is a program/project previously funded by the Gila River Indian Community, describe efforts made towards the previously described sustainability plan.

In the past, we have received grants and donations from other sources to fund our clinics. We continue to apply for grants from new sources.

12. Describe your plan to document progress and results.

We use ShelterLuv software and dedicated spreadsheets to document each clinic. We document the number of animals treated, names and contact information for each client, the

surgery and inoculations received by each animal and the associated costs. This, in turn, is reflected in the balance remaining of the associated grant. We provide quarterly detailed reports to each of our grant providers. We also tailor the information we gather to the requirements of each provider.

Project Budget Detail

- 1. Male and female surgeries involve differing costs. Male surgery is much simpler and faster with only one usual addition. Females require a more involved surgery which can involve several different additional costs. For instance, male surgeries are usually about \$60 with only a cryptorchid testicle increasing the cost. Females average about \$85 but being in heat, pregnant, or having an enlarged uterus can increase that figure. We have found over the past few years that averaging \$100 per surgery gives us an accurate cost estimate. Using that \$100 figure, we require the clients pay \$60. We are asking GRIC to fund the rest of the \$100 per animal cost.
- 2. Most of our clients do not avail themselves of veterinary services for the simple reason that they consider these costs discretionary spending. Our providers require rabies vaccinations at the clinics. Since the clients have very little money and rabies vaccinations are so important, we ask our grantors to absorb that cost.
- 3. The cost to spay or neuter a feral animal are the same as a pet. We have already purchased traps and show our clients how to use them effectively. We also loan these traps to our clients at no cost. Of the \$100 per animal for spay or neuter, we ask the client to pay \$30 for neighborhood TNR cats. We are asking GRIC to fund the remainder of the cost.
- 4. TNR animals must receive a rabies vaccination. These shots are \$18 per animal. We are asking GRIC to fund this cost.
- 5. FVRCP+C shots are \$20. Protecting as large a part of the animal population as possible helps protect all. Our clients pay \$12 toward the cost of the shot. We are asking GRIC to fund the remainder.
