A. Purpose of Grant

In Maricopa and Pinal County, veterans and their families face a critical shortage of accessible PTSD wellness services, entrepreneurship training, mentoring, and collaborative workspace. The Maricopa Veterans Care Center (MVCC) seeks a \$150,000 grant from the Ak-Chin Indian Community to acquire a one-acre to three-acre parcel and complete all architectural, engineering, and permitting work for a 3,000 sq ft Veterans Entrepreneurship Training & Mentoring Center—which will also serve as MVCC's headquarters and VA Health & Wellness hub. This Phase I funding will resolve two urgent needs:

- 1. Trauma-Informed Wellness & Support: A no-cost facility providing free PTSD therapy, stress-disorder diagnosis, job training, and transitional housing services as part of MVCC's core mission to advance veteran care through research, education, and trained staff.
- 2. Entrepreneurship & Co-Working Hub: Flexible workspace, mentorship pods, and business-development programming tailored to veterans, caregivers, and family members.

Currently, Maricopa/Pinal County has no facilities offering combined free PTSD and business-development programming, and only a few for-profit co-working options with prohibitive fees. As a result, many veterans either receive no ongoing support or must travel long distances for intermittent workshops. By securing land and completing schematic design and permitting in 2026, MVCC will be poised to begin construction in early 2027 and open in mid-2028—maximizing every dollar for tangible, capital-asset creation under the Ak-Chin 12% guideline.

1. Project Description & Need

- Land Acquisition & Permitting (Q1–Q2 2026):
 Purchase a one-acre to three-acre site in Maricopa's enterprise zone—near public transit and business corridors—then finalize schematic architectural plans, engineering studies, and submit all city and county permits.
- Co-Working & Training Space:
 Design flexible classrooms, confidential mentorship pods, open-plan work areas (up to 60 users), A/V systems, a tech-equipped resource library, and private counseling rooms.

• MVCC Headquarters: Incorporate administrative offices and reception, eliminating MVCC's current rent burden and co-locating wellness and entrepreneurial services on-site.

2. Target Population

Over the grant year (Jan 1-Dec 31 2026), Phase I activities will directly engage:

- 600 veteran and family entrepreneurs (80% veterans, 20% caregivers/spouses) through design charrettes, focus groups, and stakeholder workshops.
- 300 participants in MVCC's "Family Enterprise Pipeline," introducing entrepreneurship fundamentals alongside PTSD-aware coaching.
- 1,000 total beneficiaries—including extended family members and community partners—gaining access to wellness services, mentoring, and eventual co-working membership.

B. Resources to be raised

We are requesting Funding & In-Kind Support from other organizations for all monies needed (Capital Campaign Total: \$1,000,000)

- \$500,000 from private donors and corporate pledges
- \$200,000 City of Maricopa ARPA allocation for land infrastructure
- \$50,000 in-kind legal and appraisal services (pro bono by Board Member)

Strategic Partners

To ensure robust programming and community engagement, MVCC will collaborate with:

- City of Maricopa Economic Development Department for site-selection guidance and permit-expediting support.
- Maricopa Community Colleges Small Business Development Center (SBDC) for curriculum design and workshop facilitation.
- Local First Arizona to connect veterans with peer networks and vendor opportunities.
- Ak-Chin Employment & Training to integrate tribal workforce development into our programs.

Sustainability Plan

By Year 3, operating revenues—room rentals, sponsorships, MVCC membership dues, and program fees—will cover 100% of annual operations. A sliding-scale membership model ensures core services remain free or low-cost for veterans and underserved users, while premium options (e.g., dedicated desks, private offices) subsidize community access.

Alignment with Tribal Funding History

Over the next 18 months, MVCC will pursue similar \$250K capital requests from Gila River and Tohono O'odham tribal entities, demonstrating both scalability and broad tribal support for veteran-led entrepreneurship.

C. Accounting & Reporting

- Dedicated Fund Tracking: All grant proceeds recorded in QuickBooks under an "Ak-Chin Grant" class.
- Quarterly Financial Statements: Issued by a CPA, reconciled to bank records, and reviewable by Ak-Chin staff.

If only partial funding is awarded, MVCC will first allocate \$150,000 to secure the land parcel; subsequent tranches will follow the above priority sequence to ensure each funding release delivers tangible progress.
