Dear Taxpayer:

We're responding to your request dated Jan. 26, 2021, about your tax-exempt status.

We issued you a determination letter in January 1965, recognizing you as tax-exempt under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501(c)

Dear Chairman Norris,

The Opportunity Tree (TOT) is respectfully requesting \$20,000 to support our Youth Transition Program. Programming will take place in Pinal County, and they will be our municipal partner. The program will address Tohono O'odham Nation's education priority by providing educational

services for youth with intellectual or developmental disabilities (IDD) who are transitioning to adulthood. The program will be done during after-school hours, school breaks, and over the summer, and will include employment preparation, social skills, health, and life skills training. These activities will prepare youth for their transition from high school to adulthood. The Opportunity Tree appreciates the opportunity to apply for funds from Tohono O'odham Nation.



A: Explain the perceived need and explain how the proposal will address that need.

Every year 150,000 - 200,000 students with disabilities age out of special education. Most of them are likely to have IDD. The transition from public school into the adult world offers no services for further education, goals, and career training. (The Arch, 2017). Because there is no support in transitioning, young adults with IDD are left to continue living at home without having the opportunity to engage in the community. Oftentimes, loved ones do not have the bandwidth to support the people they care for with IDD. This means that there are no options to socialize, exercise safely, and create concrete goals. The increased life expectancy of adults with IDD (the average adult with Down syndrome is expected to live well past 60, according to the National Down Syndrome Society) means that most of these adults will long outlive their parents. This can be frightening for young people with IDD who have never had the opportunity to be independent before.

This grant would help support our Youth Transition Program, which prepares youth with IDD, ages 14-22, for successful transitions from high school to the adult world. The Opportunity Tree helps youth achieve goals through the Youth Transition Program.

Our objective is to prepare youth with IDD for a successful transition from high school to independence and life as an adult. For many youth with IDD, the transition from high school to the adult world can be filled with



confusion and apprehension. The Youth Transition Program provides center- and community-based services, including after-school and structured programming during the summer months. Youth focus on vocational and employment training, while also participating in life and social skills training, physical fitness, and healthy living sessions.

To implement this program successfully, our instructors use evidence-based curriculum and modalities to provide individualized support to our members and their families. We will increase our youth participants' opportunities for success with the following activities: 1) Conduct outreach to special education classrooms throughout Pinal County; 2) Provide one-on-one case management for families who need assistance with assessment and transitions planning; 3) Encourage students to enroll in and complete our structured training programs (Transition to Employment Program and/or Pre-Employment Transition Services workshops); and 4) Offer workshops that outline resources available to support families and youth through transition (e.g. guardianship process, financial planning, Social Security programs, day programs, vocational training programs, and residential services).

At The Opportunity Tree, the Youth Transition Program helps individuals with IDD become their

own advocates and champions, and as a result, become more independent in their employment, and develop capabilities to live happy and fulfilling lives.

B: Describe the population who will benefit from the proposal if approved.

With this funding request, The Opportunity Tree plans to serve at least 50 youth with developmental and intellectual disabilities, ages 14-22,

in Pinal County over one year. Youth served will come from diverse races, ethnicities, and income levels and have developmental disabilities including autism, epilepsy, cerebral palsy, and cognitive impairment.

TOT measures outcomes and successes through the number of clients participating in the program, data collected in case management files on each member's progress and program modules completed, and staff and direct service professional observation.

Our Youth Transition Program will fulfill the following objectives:

- 50 youth with IDD will receive workforce and life skills training.
- 85% of participating youth will gain the skills to prepare them for successful transition out of high school.
- 100% of participating youth will gain increased selfconfidence and social skills.



Beyond these outcomes, the success of our Youth Transition Program is also measured by our impact on our clients. This success is demonstrated in testimonials from our clients like mom Dorothy, who said: "I've really seen a lot of growth in David since he started going to your Youth Transition Program!"

The Opportunity Tree applied for and was awarded \$15,000 from the Ak-Chin Indian Community to support our Healthy Habits Program in 2018, 2020, and 2021. We also received funding for our youth transitions program from the Gila River Indian Community in 2019 for \$25,000 and in 2020 for \$20,000.
