Winkelman Resource Management Center Historical Demonstration Garden

a) Explain the perceived need and explain how the proposal will address that need.

Winkelman Resource Management Center (WRMC), a 501(c)(3) received a donation of 10 acres in Dudleyville, AZ in 2021. This donated property is now managed, with the help of its partner organization the Winkelman Natural Resource Conservation District (WNRCD), for outreach and education in natural resource management and local agriculture. This property has a well and electricity, but no other infrastructure. The WRMC plans to build a hoop house to grow native plants for restoration and host workshops about basic backyard gardening, soil and water conservation, and historical food crops of the San Pedro River Valley. The WRMC is seeking funds to build an irrigation system to support the native plant garden on ¹/₂ acre, 3 acres of local and historical food crops, and a native plant nursery.

The outcome of this project is to provide positive, practical, and enriching ways to educate the community adults and children about our natural resources and teach them skills they can take back to their homes and into the community. The site will be used to demonstrate how to grow local food crops that are best suited to the environment and that were historically grown in the area. Community landowners will learn how to create their own gardens from how to build an irrigation system to what seeds to plant. Additionally, we will help foster skills in the students, young and old, to learn about the importance of healthy eating, become more interested in local and regenerative food sources, and experience the pride that comes from working hard and reaping the benefits. Finally, the community will develop an appreciation for our environment, recognize that natural resources, including water and soil, are limited and precious, and begin to understand the critical balance between environmental stewardship and the need to produce food.

b) Describe the population who will benefit from the proposal if approved.

The Winkelman Natural Resource Conservation District (WNRCD) is 1,609,470 acres almost entirely within Pinal County. There are 7 major communities within the District that range in size from about 235 - 3600 people and are predominantly rural and developing urban communities. The WNRCD has close ties with community leaders in county and town governments, k-12 schools, and the Central Arizona College, and has large potential for support by these closely tied communities. Agriculture is a strong contributor to the economy of the district. However, agricultural knowledge within these small rural/urban communities does not go much beyond families that are involved in it.

The geographic area consists of seven small towns located in eastern Pinal County and western Gila County. Historically, these towns relied on agriculture and mining as the major economic drivers. In 2000, the largest US copper mine located in San Manuel closed. Several thousand

workers lost their jobs, and many relocated. This project is one way to help people reduce food costs by helping them grow their own food. The project can also spark new businesses as aspiring entrepreneurs learn new food products and processes that can support a growing business. This geographic area desperately needs methods to retain residents and attract new people. Of great concern is the vast migration of youth to larger cities once they graduate from high school. For these towns to survive, a way must be found for people to earn a living based on local resources.

We live in a food desert - none of these rural towns have a full-size grocery store. Most of them have a small independent market and a "Dollar" store with only small amounts or no fresh produce. Travel to a large grocery for most residents is 45 minutes to one hour.

Most of the students in the area have little to no experiences with farming or even backyard gardens. Since the Ray District is a small rural school, they have also been impacted by declining enrollment and budget cuts. Consequently, many of their enrichment programs have been eliminated over the course of the last decade. The objectives include educating our community about nature, conservation, health, and agriculture, through growing native plants and crops. This project will serve approximately 300 people a year.
